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## Pastor's Column



### **From the Desk of Pastor Marv Herman**

<sup>25</sup> “Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes?”

<sup>26</sup> Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more

valuable than they? <sup>27</sup> Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?<sup>28</sup> “And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. <sup>29</sup> Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one

of these. <sup>30</sup> If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? <sup>31</sup> So do not worry, saying, ‘What shall we eat?’ or ‘What shall we drink?’ or ‘What shall we wear?’ <sup>32</sup> For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. <sup>33</sup> But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. <sup>34</sup> Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. **Matthew 6: 25-30.**

In the course of daily living, there are so many things that can weigh heavy on our hearts. Over time, these once small concerns, become so great, that they now become like a darkness closing in on us. Throughout our lives, friends have probably tried to reassure us, over and over again that many of our concerns are not as bad as they seem, but in the course of a few lonely moments, these small concerns become overwhelming, making

anyone's assurances seem empty.

I remember back when I felt emotionally overwhelmed about the turn of events in my life. In the summer of 2007, I became a single parent raising two young daughters. To add to this, I was also one of three church youth group leaders at the Fenton United Methodist Church. It took two years for our youth group to raise funds to go on a two-week mission trip to West Virginia in late June of that year and I was committed, no matter what, not to let the youth group leaders and our youth down by not going with them. So, I arranged for my daughters to stay with family, and I helped drive our youth group to the back hills and hollers of West Hamlin, West Virginia. For 2 weeks, I experienced poverty like I have never witnessed before in my life. It was hard to believe in the United States, there were children who literally had no shoes to wear and very little food to eat. Sadly, most of the adults raising these children drank alcohol heavily. Many of those

same families, pooled some of their money together to purchase 20-year-old school buses, which they then placed on their mountain side property. Then they anchored it down so it would not roll down the mountain. Now these old buses became a home for 6 to 10 people. Even the seats in the buses were utilized and turned into beds, furniture and lawn seats.

After 5 days of helping these families paint and repair their homes, it seemed our efforts only put a small dent into their living conditions. I became overwhelmed. A youth leader from another church from Ohio, who I had gotten to know, recognized the shroud of gloom that was enveloping me. At the end of a work day, he invited me out for coffee and asked me why I was so gloomy.

That was all the invitation I needed, and I began to lay out my litany of woes, which included all the things in my life mixed in with my feelings of dealing with the West Virginia families who lived in such poor conditions. Quickly my new friend stopped me and said, "Whoa! You got a lot to unpack here! I need to know the magnitude of each of these problems. Consider this method; if the problem is the equivalent of needing to put gas in your car... score it a one; but if the problem is compared to dealing with your imminent death, then I would rate that a ten."

So, I started over, each item on my list when compared to the poor I was working with in

West Hamlin, quickly became rated perhaps a two or a one. Looking back, I realize most of the concerns on my heart I shared with him, would have been a one or even less. On that day my new-found friend helped me see that we can indeed make mountains out of mole hills. The onslaught of daily life can indeed distort our perspective and as a result of our distorted vision, we can make poor choices in our lives.

In a recent reading in an Upper Room devotion book I read one morning, one of the authors noted that each and every day in our lives can present to us many forks in the road where we have got to make a choice (to do this or to do that) and each of those choices adjusts the direction of our lives. This got me thinking... all it takes, is just making a couple of severe right hand turns in the wrong direction, and our lives can quickly change from good to awful. I found that reality to be true when I myself, made a few poor choices in my lifetime.

Beyond the choices we make in life, one can also face moments of adversity, illness, accidents or an economic downturn leading to a loss of job. This can lead anyone to experience a moment of despair. The darkness of such moments, layered with everything else, can indeed become crushing to one's life. Here then are some very powerful words Jesus said to his disciples in the gospel of Matthew, "And behold, you are never alone, for I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20)

In all that confronts us in life

the good news is this; "We are not alone." This is the truth that lifts our spirits, no matter what confronts us in this life. It doesn't matter whether the issues seem big or small; we are not alone. This gospel truth is also found in Matthew 6: 26, which say, "*Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?*" Yes, consider the birds and remember that God provides for all our needs. God gives us his grace to help us grow in our faith even when we have to bear the darkest moment of the night. God is our comforter and he is always willing to guide us to the dawn found in and through the light in Jesus Christ. As the children of God, we can indeed testify to the light even when the darkness seems all around us... for we know all darkness will not last, for the light of Christ is fast upon us. Remember, God through Christ, is with us until the end of time. Until that time, Christ will provide for us and through faith, He will indeed provide for us all that we need.
